MSM Youth, Love & Intimacy: Noel Ramirez, MSW, MPH from Y-HEP and Jay Grant, MSW from The Attic will discuss MSM youth, love, intimacy, and prevention messages with a focus on how we look at this from a “trauma informed” perspective.

Social Media, Teens & Condoms: Matt Prior, MPH from the Philadelphia Department of Public Health’s “Take Control, Philly” Condom Campaign and Debasri Ghosh from Women’s Way will discuss Social Media, its relationship to “slut shaming” and how to encourage healthy choices.

Teen Pregnancy Prevention - Lessons from the Field: Tristan Ruby, MPH, Program Director at PHMC will discuss lessons learned from the “Plain Talk” teen pregnancy prevention initiative.

Breakout Session 2:

Preventing & Recovering from Teen Sexual Assault: Salamishah Tillet, PhD is an associate professor at the University of Pennsylvania and co-founder of “A Long Walk Home,” a nonprofit that uses art therapy, visual and performing arts to end violence against girls and women. Dr. Tillet will share lessons learned from The Girl/Friends Leadership Institutes, an art-based youth-led program that organizes high school girls to end sexual assault and sexual harassment in their schools and communities.
