

What Is Disability.gov?

Disability.gov is the federal government website for comprehensive information on disability programs and services in communities nationwide.

Visitors are connected to more than 15,000 resources on topics such as applying for benefits, getting health care, finding a job and paying for housing. The site provides information from federal, state and local government agencies; academic institutions; and nonprofit organizations.

Disability.gov is managed by the U.S. Department of Labor in collaboration with 21 federal agency partners.


