

Rabbi Freedman is a member of the clergy team at Rodeph Shalom. His three major areas of work include the Mercaz Limud Religious School, the RiSe Up Social Justice Initiative, and various young adult projects including the Young Friends Group and Next Dor. His other rabbinic duties include leading services, preaching, counseling on life-cycle events, and conducting adult education. Prior to his current position, Rabbi Freedman served as Rabbinic Intern at the NYU Hillel. He spent the first three years of rabbinical school in London and worked as a student rabbi at Edgware and District Reform Synagogue, the largest Reform congregation in Europe. He also ran the outreach and engagement program at Columbia/Barnard University, where he worked to attract unaffiliated Jews to Jewish life. Her research interests include underserved communities of color, the developing world, and access to care for people living with HIV. Dr. Kwakwa is a graduate of Bryn Mawr College. She obtained her Medical Degree from Yale University School of Medicine, and interned and completed a residency at Miriam Hospital at the Brown University School of Medicine in Rhode Island. Ms. Clark is the Coordinator of Prevention Services at ActionAIDS in Philadelphia. She has worked in health education, training, and counseling for over 17 years, including 13 years as an Adjunct Instructor for undergraduate and graduate-level courses in Public Health and Human Services. Throughout her public health career, Ms. Clark has advocated for gender and sexual health equality across the life cycle. Her work expertise includes health education and prevention in the areas of HIV/AIDS, sexuality and reproductive health, GLBT (Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgendered) issues, college health, and intimate partner violence prevention. Ms. Clark participates in a number of groups and committees. She serves on the Prevention Planning Group for the City of Philadelphia's Office of HIV Planning, and co-chairs the Literature & Education Committee. She serves on the material review committees for the City's AIDS Activities Coordinating Office and the School District Board of Education. Ms. Clark is also Co-Chair of the LGBT Elder initiative of the Delaware Valley, whose mission is to foster and advocate for services that are culturally-competent, inclusive, and responsive to the needs of LGBT elders in the Delaware Valley.

Ms. Bungy is employed by Drexel University College of Medicine as the HIV Prevention Services Program Manager for the Dorothy Mann Ctr. for Pediatric & Adolescent HIV at the St. Christopher's Hospital for Children.

She is responsible for developing and managing relationships with community partners to raise HIV awareness and to implement onsite counseling and testing programs. Community partners have included family medical centers, churches, charter schools, domestic violence agencies, the Police Athletic League, youth detention centers and homeless shelters.

Ms. Bungy and her staff provide interactive, engaging and age-appropriate HIV Education and Prevention workshops during HIV testing events. Ms. Bungy has a strong interest in Emergency Preparedness, and is certified in CPR and First Aid. In her spare time, she volunteers as Disaster Action Team Coordinator for the American Red Cross, providing temporary relief to survivors of local fires, floods and building collapses. Ms. Bungy is an active member of the Pennsylvania Public Health Association, the American Public Health Association and the Society for Public Health Educators. She earned her BA in Psychology from Rowan University and her Master's Degree of Public Health from Drexel University, and was certified in 2008 as a Health Education Specialist by the National Commission for Health Education Credentialing, Incorporated. In 2009, Ms. Bungy received the "Woman of Excellence" Award from the Eagle Awards Association for her community organizing efforts. She is an enthusiastic and energetic person who enjoys her work and the people she serves.

Dr. Chernak is the Director of the Center of Public Health Readiness and Communication at the Drexel University School of Public Health, where she is an Associate Research Professor in the Division of Environmental and Occupational Health. She also works as a Medical Specialist in Infectious Diseases at Philadelphia Department of Public Health (PDPH) primary care health centers, operated by the Division of Ambulatory Health Services. From 2007 through July 2009, Dr. Chernak was the Medical Director for the PDPH Acute Communicable Disease Control Program, where she was responsible for conducting communicable disease surveillance and outbreak investigations. From 1999 through 2008, Dr. Chernak developed the PDPH Public Health Emergency Preparedness Program, where she led public health preparedness planning, training and exercises for the city. Dr. Chernak is Board-certified physician in Internal Medicine and Infectious Diseases. She received a Bachelor's degree in Comparative Literature from Princeton University, a Doctor of Medicine degree from UMDNJ-Robert Wood Johnson Medical School and a Master of Public Health degree from the Medical College of Wisconsin.

Ms. Aaron works for the Department of infectious Disease and HIV at the Drexel University College of Medicine, where she oversees a GYN/family planning clinic and coordinates a prenatal clinic for HIV-positive pregnant women. She initiated rapid HIV testing programs in the Hahnemann University Hospital delivery room and emergency department. She currently sees patients at the Partnership Comprehensive Care Practice, the Partnership Plus clinic in the Women's Care Center, and St. Christopher's Hospital for Children. Ms. Aaron is certified as an Adult Nurse Practitioner by the American Nurses Credentialing Center, and is an AIDS Certified Registered Nurse. She is also credentialed as an HIV Specialist by the American Academy of Medicine. Ms. Aaron is a member of the United States Public Health Service Task Force Perinatal HIV Guidelines Working Group and of the Philadelphia Family Planning Council Medical Committee.

Ms. Abdul-Khabeer is the Deputy Director for the Circle of Care. This Family Planning Council program provides HIV-related care and services to women, children and their families. Ms. Abdul-Khabeer is responsible for managing the \$4 million budget and programs including Clinical and Specialty HIV Medicine, Case Management and Support Services, Perinatal Transmission Prevention, Prevention Education, and Counseling and Testing. She is a Registered Nurse with a specialty in Infectious Diseases, and has advocated for culturally-appropriate HIV prevention education and services for communities of color since 1983. In 1985, Ms. Abdul-Khabeer founded BEBASHI: Blacks Educating Blacks About Sexual Health Issues. BEBASHI is a Philadelphia-area organization that provides sexual health education, case management and support service to a variety of populations. Ms. Abdul-Khabeer is a founding member of the Circle of Care, the Philadelphia AIDS Consortium, the Minority AIDS Project of Philadelphia, and the National Minority AIDS Council. She has served as a consultant on AIDS education, services and policy development for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Health Resource Services Administration, MACRO International, the Philadelphia Department of Public Health, and numerous community-based organizations. Ms. Abdul-Khabeer's areas of expertise include community organizing, organizational development, proposal writing, program development, and grants management. She serves as a Public Health lecturer in several university and collegiate programs in the Philadelphia area. Ms. Abdul-Khabeer received her nursing education from the Medical College of Pennsylvania, her Master in Human Services degree from Lincoln University in Pennsylvania, and is currently pursuing a Doctorate at Capella University.

HIV Testing Kit Demonstration

Ms. Tyler is the Health Services Social Work Supervisor at Philadelphia Prisons System (PPS), where she manages a team of skilled Health Services Social Workers who provide HIV counseling and testing for detainees. She also works closely with medical contractors and other agencies that provide continuity of care for HIV positive individuals at PPS. Ms. Tyler has been an employee of the Philadelphia Health Department since 2005. Prior to her current role, she was a Health Services Social Worker who addressed issues and concerns of detainees at PPS female correctional sites. Ms. Tyler has worked and volunteered for under-served populations in the field of Social Services for over twelve years. Her early exposure to social disparities prompted her to be an advocate in the struggle for equity for all Philadelphia citizens. Ms. Tyler has worked with a variety of populations including older adults, chronically homeless individuals, and women and children. Her work has been highlighted in local newspapers and television. Tahira is a proud Philadelphia native, and is a graduate of Julia Reynolds Masterman High School. Ms. Tyler obtained her Bachelor of Arts from Spelman College in Atlanta, Georgia with studies in Sociology and Anthropology. In her spare time, she enjoys working and volunteering for her preteen daughter's many extra-curricular activities.

Rev. Miles joined Enon Tabernacle Baptist Church 1996 under the leadership of Reverend Doctor Alyn E Waller. Reverend Miles has served in various church capacities including Deacon of the Biblical House of Joshua, and currently provides leadership to the Balm in Gilead counseling ministry. Some of the programmatic components of this ministry include the L.I.V.E. (Living In Victory Everyday) HIV/AIDS ministry, Dawning of a New Day domestic violence ministry, My Brothers' Keeper men's support group for anger management, Deliverance drug and alcohol ministry, Sacred Sanctuary for survivors of sexual abuse, and Men of Iron. Rev. Miles serves on several community boards including Students Run Philly Style and the Community Advisory Board of the Philadelphia Faith-based HIV Prevention Coalition. He is a Pittsburgh-area native who moved to Philadelphia in the late nineties to establish Miles Insurance Agency Incorporated, where he has served as President for 15 years. Reverend Miles holds a B.A. in Communications and an M.A. in Organizational Communications from Edinboro University of Pennsylvania. He recently completed a chaplaincy at Children's

Hospital of Pennsylvania, and currently attends Palmer Theological Seminary, where he expects to obtain a Master of Divinity degree this May. Reverend Miles's hobbies include marital arts, 2nd Degree Black Belt, running, and competing in endurance events such as the Tough Mudder. He and his wife Felicia are the proud parents of two lovely daughters Bria and Lea.

Ms. Johnson is employed in the Underwriting department at CIGNA Insurance Company. She has been an active member of Enon Tabernacle Baptist Church since 2006, has been part of the church's L.I.V.E. (Living In Victory Everyday) HIV/AIDS ministry since 2007, and has been the LIVE Servant Leader since 2010. Ms. Johnson counts it as an honor and privilege to humbly serve God's people through this ministry. Her passion is fueled by her desire to prevent other families from going through what her own family experienced: the devastating tragedy of losing loved ones to AIDS. She believes that no one should suffer from AIDS alone and in silence; this drives her to share the love of God with people suffering from the disease. Ms. Johnson's teenage daughter Jekeira also serves in the LIVE Ministry. Ms. Johnson envisions the day when God's people love persons who are infected with HIV/AIDS without stigma, just as God loves all of His children. She draws strength and encouragement from one of her favorite scripture passages - Lamentations 3:22-23: "Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for His compassions never fail. They are new every morning: great is Your faithfulness." Ms. Johnson was born and raised in Philadelphia, and has a Bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice from Temple University.

Philadelphia's Citywide Interfaith HIV Prevention Campaign: Results and Lessons Learned

Dr. Nunn is Assistant Professor of Medicine and Assistant Professor of Behavioral and Social Sciences in the Division of Infectious Diseases at Brown Medical School. She currently conducts social science research examining the structural, social and behavioral factors influencing racial disparities in HIV infection in the United States. Dr. Nunn received an NIH Career Development Award in 2009 to investigate the role of concurrent sexual partnerships and other factors in potentiating racial disparities in HIV infection, and received the "Outstanding New Researcher Award" at the 2009 CDC HIV Prevention Conference. In 2010, Dr. Nunn partnered with Black clergy in Philadelphia to mount a citywide HIV testing and prevention campaign. She continues to collaborate with dozens of churches and mosques in Philadelphia and Jackson, Mississippi to promote HIV prevention and research activities. Dr. Nunn holds Masters and Doctoral degrees from the Harvard School of Public Health, and is a former Fulbright Scholar.
