- 811,335 people have received at least one dose and 579,266 people are fully vaccinated in Philadelphia as of May 10, 2021.

3 Reasons to Still Wear a Mask After You Are Vaccinated

- Vaccines don't protect you right away
 - It takes time for your body to build protection against the COVID-19 virus.
 - You are not "fully vaccinated" until 2 weeks after your 2nd dose of Pfizer/Moderna or 2 weeks after your one and only dose of J&J vaccine.
- You can still pass the virus to others if you are vaccinated and do not feel sick
 - All COVID-19 vaccines are very good at protecting you from getting the COVID-19 virus, but it may be possible for you to give the virus to someone else, even if you feel healthy and have gotten your vaccine.
- Help protect people who are more likely to get extremely sick from the COVID-19 virus
 - Some people are not able to get vaccinated and some people with certain chronic medical conditions, such as heart disease or cancer, may become severely sick with COVID-19. Your mask gives them extra protection that could save their lives.
 - Some people have weak immune systems, such as people with cancer, so the vaccine might not give them as much protection.
