# Doxycycline Shortage February 20, 2013

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) reported a shortage of doxycycline on January 18, 2013. Since the initial announcement, the CDC has been made aware that tetracycline is also unavailable. Doxycycline is a recommended therapy for some sexually transmitted infections and syndromes including chlamydia, nongonococcal urethritis, epididymitis and pelvic inflammatory disease. It is also an alternative therapy for syphilis in patients with a penicillin allergy. Doxycycline tablets and capsules are currently available in limited supplies. Other CDC-recommended and additional alternative regimens are listed below and outlined in the 2010 STD Treatment Guidelines [MMWR Dec 17, 2010/59/No RR-12].

Some pharmacies may still have a supply of doxycycline, but many may not. If you are unable to obtain doxycycline for your patients, the following alternatives are recommended by the CDC:

- Chlamydia and Nongonococcal urethritis
   Azithromycin 1 g orally in a single dose
- Gonorrhea
   Ceftriaxone 250 mg IM in a single dose
   PLUS
   Azithromycin 1 g orally in a single dose
- Pelvic Inflammatory Disease\*
   Ceftriaxone 250 mg IM in a single dose PLUS
   Clindamycin 450 mg orally four times daily for 14 days
   WITH OR WITHOUT
   Metronidazole 500 mg orally twice a day for 14 days
