• COVID-19 vaccine for children under 5

- The CDC and the FDA approved the Moderna and Pfizer vaccine for children under 5
- Everyone ages 6 months and older is eligible to get vaccinated against COVID-19.

COVID-19: Resources and Services

• Where to find COVID-19 vaccine:

- Call 3-1-1 or visit phila.gov/vaccine or vaccines.gov to find a vaccine clinic near you.
 - For interpretation, call 3-1-1, press #5 and say your language.
 - Visit https://bit.ly/KnowB4Ugo for updates on transportation, access and functional needs resources, and up-to-date access descriptions of City-run clinics.
- Options for COVID-19 vaccines for uninsured residents include:
 - Free vaccine at City health centers and pop-up clinics, for insured and uninsured residents. No ID is required at these locations
 - Other sites, like pharmacies, may bill your insurance company or charge you a direct fee. Call these sites before you go to find out about their policies.

• What to do if you lost your vaccination card?

- Ask your healthcare provider first, if they cannot help, call 215-685-5488 or email covid@phila.gov to request a copy of your vaccine record.
- The CDC does not provide copies of COVID-19 vaccination card.
- Stock up on FREE N95 masks
 - Visit https://bit.ly/FreeN95s for free masks from the Strategic National Stockpile
- Stock up on home tests
 - How to get FREE home tests even if you do not have insurance:
 - Each household can place 3 orders of 4 free tests, for 12 tests total.
 - Order at: https://www.covidtests.gov/

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• How to get home tests paid for if you do have insurance:

- Health insurance companies are required to reimburse 8 at-home tests per month for each person enrolled in the plan and will reimburse up to \$12 per individual test.
- Submit receipts for tests that you've purchased to your health plan, along with any other necessary documentation required by the health plan.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) on Extreme Heat in Philadelphia

- Why is extreme heat a problem in Philadelphia?
 - Between 2006 and 2018 there were 137 heat-related deaths in the City of Philadelphia.
 - Philadelphia is getting hotter because of climate change.
 - Summers are getting hotter, and we are experiencing more hot days in a row.
 - Heat events and hot days are expected to continue to increase in Philadelphia.

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Public Health

- Like other cities, Philadelphia is especially at risk of extreme heat. Due to what is called the "urban heat island effect".
 - This means that cities are hotter than suburban areas because cities often have fewer trees and less green space.
- Are heat waves the same in every part of the city?
 - No, some areas of the city can be as much as 20 degrees hotter.
 - Hotter areas tend to have fewer trees and fewer parks, so have less shade. Buildings can retain heat even through the night, so there really isn't much of a break during a heat wave.
 - Areas that are hotter tend to be areas that have less resources and where people are less able to afford air conditioning. This makes heat emergencies even more dangerous.
- How do we know summers are getting hotter in Philadelphia?
 - Last year Philadelphia recorded 36 days of 90-plus temperatures, however the long-term average is 21 days of 90-plus temperatures.
 - The summer months from June 1st August 31st, officially went on record as the third-warmest meteorological summer in Philadelphia's 150-year period of recording temperatures.
- What services open in Philadelphia only during a Heat Emergency?
 - During a heat emergency, PDPH focuses resources on the areas of the city that are hotter and where people are less able to afford air conditioning and other resources to stay safe.
 - During a heat emergency, cooling centers will open to give people a FREE, safe place to escape from the heat.
 - Even just spending an hour or two in a cooling center can help prevent someone from getting sick with a heat-related illness, during a heat wave.
 - Most cooling centers are libraries. You can visit a library to cool off any time they are open.
 - Find cooling centers at: **bit.ly/PhillyHeatEmergency** or call 3-1-1.
 - During a heat emergency, the PCA Helpline becomes the PCA Heatline
 - Hours are extended to 24/7 and the phoneline becomes staffed by trained nurses.
 - Call: 215-765-9040
 - During a heat emergency, utility shut offs are temporarily suspended.
