WEEKLY MONKEYPOX UPDATE

LATEST NUMBERS

- As of October 11, 2022:
 - 513 total Monkeypox cases (confirmed + presumed)
 - Information on criteria for presumed cases available [here](#).
 - 7,296 doses have been administered.
 - Information on the federal management of Monkeypox vaccine delivery available [here](#).
- Data on Monkeypox cases and vaccine distribution, with demographic characteristics, are updated [here](#) every Monday.
 - The Health Department, as part of its goal to be as transparent as possible, is one of the first jurisdictions in the country to report demographics on both people who have monkeypox and vaccine recipients.

LATEST NEWS

- **New CDC Health Advisory: If you were exposed to monkeypox through sexual contact, you should also be tested for HIV and other sexually transmitted infections.**
 - On 10/4/2022, the CDC released [this Health Advisory](#) over their Health Alert Network on severe signs and symptoms of monkeypox among people who are immunocompromised.
 - Recommendations for healthcare providers:
 - Healthcare providers should be aware of risk factors for severe manifestations of monkeypox and should conduct HIV testing for people with confirmed or suspected monkeypox.
 - Recommendations for the public:
 - If you were exposed to monkeypox through sexual contact, you should also be tested for HIV and other sexually transmitted infections.
 - Background:
 - During the current outbreak in the United States, 38 percent of people diagnosed with monkeypox were coinfecting with HIV and most reported cases of monkeypox with severe manifestations have been among people living with untreated HIV.

- **New CDC Guidance on JYNNEOS administration**
 - The CDC now allows people to get their vaccine in an alternative location if they are concerned about stigma cause by the red mark left by the vaccine.
 - Those concerned can request intradermal administration at the deltoid (upper arm) or scapula (back).
 - Some providers may not be able to accommodate this request.
- **Second doses**
 - The monkeypox vaccine, JYNNEOS, is a two-dose series, with dose 2 recommended 28 days after dose 1.
 - PDPH is beginning to contact people who got their first doses over the summer to bring them back for second doses.
 - However, PDPH is still prioritizing distribution of first doses, so it will take some time to recall persons who previously received subcutaneous vaccination.
 - It is ok if the second occurs more than 28 days after the first dose. You do not need to restart the vaccine series, and a delay will not negatively impact the immune response to the second dose.



- While people are waiting to be contacted for their second dose from the Health Department, people should be encouraged to contact their healthcare providers to see if they are offering JYNNEOS vaccine. People should also continue to take precautions against monkeypox until 14 days after their second dose, when maximum immunity is reached.
- All second doses will be administered intradermally, regardless of whether or the first dose was subcutaneous or intradermal.

LATEST VACCINATION AND CONTAINMENT RESOURCES

- **Reach out and connect**
 - Reach out to friends and contacts to get the emotional and logistical support you need to deal with this virus.

- **Call the PDPH Center at 215-685-5488 for any possible or known exposure to Monkeypox**
 - The call center will ask questions to determine risk of exposure and eligibility to be vaccinated.
 - The call center can make appointments for eligible residents to get a Monkeypox vaccine and provide guidance on quarantine, isolation, and safety following exposure.
- **Bring the Monkeypox Vaccine to You**
 - If you have an event coming up, PDPH can host an information table and sign eligible people up for Monkeypox vaccine appointments.

LATEST ADVOCACY EFFORTS FOR AN EQUITABLE RESPONSE

- PDPH has expanded locations of City-run Monkeypox clinics and continues to explore options of how to make the vaccine more accessible and convenient.
 - PDPH continues the strategy of inviting individuals to get vaccinated from our databases that may be high risk, and targeted zip codes and demographics following our case trends, as well as individuals who have been identified as high risk through contact tracing.
- PDPH is attending relevant in-person and virtual events to offer current information, answer questions and help eligible people sign up on the [Vaccine Interest Form](#).

- PDPH continues to meet with the community advisory group to hear concerns, ask questions and collaborate with community members and leaders to respond to the outbreak.
