#### The Latest News

- Uganda declares the end of the current Ebola outbreak
  - On January 11, 2023, this latest outbreak of the Sudan virus was declared to be over.
    - The first case was confirmed in September 2022.
  - Although an Ebola vaccine was approved by the FDA in 2019, it does not protect against the type of Ebola virus in this last outbreak (Sudan virus).
  - The last Ebola outbreak in 2014-2016 was the largest Ebola outbreak in history.

- Caron monoxide (CO) poisoning.
  - Carbon monoxide (CO) is an odorless, colorless gas.
  - CO is found in fumes produced by furnaces, kerosene heaters, vehicles "warmed up" in garages, stoves, lanterns, and gas ranges, portable generators, or by burning charcoal and wood.
    - CO from these sources can build up in enclosed or partially enclosed spaces.
    - It's not safe to use your stove or oven to heat your home in winter.
  - People and animals in these spaces can be poisoned and can sometimes die from breathing CO.
  - CO poisoning is entirely preventable.
    - Protect yourself and your family by learning the symptoms of CO poisoning and how to prevent it.

# FAQS on Carbon Monoxide (CO) Poisoning

- What is Carbon Monoxide?
  - Carbon monoxide, or "CO," is an odorless, colorless gas that can kill you.
- Where is CO found?
  - CO is found in fumes produced any time you burn fuel in cars or trucks, small engines, stoves, lanterns, grills, fireplaces, gas ranges, or furnaces.
  - CO can build up indoors and poison people and animals who breathe it.
- Is the risk of CO poisoning worse in the winter?
  - When winter temperatures plummet and home heating systems run for hours the risk of carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning increases.
- What are the symptoms of CO poisoning?
  - The most common symptoms of CO poisoning are:
    - Headache
    - Dizziness
    - Weakness
    - Upset stomach or vomiting
    - Chest pain
    - Confusion
- What should I do if I suspect carbon monoxide poisoning?
  - Leave the building.
  - Get any victims to fresh air right away.
  - Call 911.
  - Call your local utility.
    - Call PECO at 1-800-494-4000 to report a gas or electric emergency.
- Who is at risk from CO poisoning?
  - Everyone is at risk for CO poisoning.



- Infants, the elderly, people with chronic heart disease, anemia, or breathing problems are more likely to get sick from CO.
- People who are sleeping or drunk can die from CO poisoning before they have symptoms.
- How serious is the risk of CO poisoning?
  - Each year, more than 400 Americans die from unintentional CO poisoning not linked to fires, more than 100,000 visits to the emergency room, and more than 14,000 are hospitalized.

### **COVID-19: Resources and Services**

- Where to find COVID-19 vaccine, including booster doses:
  - Call 3-1-1 or visit phila.gov/vaccine or vaccines.gov to find a vaccine clinic near you.
    - For interpretation, call 3-1-1, press #5 and say your language.

  - Options for COVID-19 vaccines for uninsured residents include:
    - Free vaccine at City health centers and pop-up clinics, for insured and uninsured residents. No ID is required at these locations.
    - Other sites, like pharmacies, may bill your insurance company or charge you a direct fee. Call these sites before you go to find out about their policies.

- Free COVID Testing Kits available for distribution by CBOs
  - PDPH has procured a supply of at-home COVID-9 test kits and will be offering these tests to community-based organizations (CBOs) serving clients and patrons in areas of high COVID-19 risk.

- What to do if you lost your vaccination card?
  - Ask your healthcare provider first. If they cannot help, call 215-685-5488 or email <a href="mailto:COVID@phila.gov">COVID@phila.gov</a> to request a copy of your vaccine record.
  - The CDC does not provide copies of COVID-19 vaccination cards.
- Stock up on FREE N95 masks
  - Visit https://bit.ly/FreeN95s for free masks from the Strategic National Stockpile.
- Stock up on home tests
  - Health insurance companies are required to reimburse 8 at-home tests per month for each person enrolled in the plan and will reimburse up to \$12 per individual test.
