We wanted to share the below updates with you about COVID-19 vaccination opportunities and new disability-specific resources available through the Philadelphia Department of Public Health (PDPH).

Homebound Vaccination Program: We have increased the provider capacity of our homebound vaccination referral program and continue to offer no-cost vaccinations to anyone who would have difficulty being vaccinated at a clinic due to a disability or health condition, as well as their caregivers and family members. Eligible individuals can get their third or booster doses at home.
