

Philadelphia Department of Public Health (PDPH) MONTHLY MPOX UPDATE

LATEST NUMBERS

- As of August 9, 2023:
 - 557 total Mpox cases (confirmed + presumed)
 - There have been 5 cases of mpox confirmed in Philadelphia since January 2023.
 - The groups of people at risk has not changed. The majority of people testing positive for mpox are still cisgender males who are Black and between the ages of 20-50.
 - 8,048 doses and 4,427 second doses have been administered.
- Every month, data on Mpox cases and vaccine distribution, including demographic characteristics, are updated here.
 - The Health Department, as part of its goal to be as transparent as possible, is one of the first jurisdictions in the country to report demographics on both people who have monkeypox and vaccine recipients.

LATEST NEWS

- MMWR reports show JYNNEOS most effective with both doses.
 - Two MMWRs (Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Reports) released in May demonstrate that the JYNNEOS vaccine is effective, and support recommended 2-dose JYNNEOS vaccine consistent with CDC and NYSDOH guidance.

 - Because duration of protection of 1 versus 2 doses remains unknown, persons at increased risk for mpox exposure should receive the 2-dose series as recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP), regardless of administration route or immunocompromised status.
 - Additionally, there was an MMWR released on the outbreak in Chicago detailing that people who
 had received both doses of JYNNEOS had less lesions on their genitals and eyes than people
 who were not vaccinated, and those who were fully vaccinated did not have to be hospitalized.

- Low vaccine rates create risk of resurgence.
 - The 2022 mpox outbreak in the United States has receded to very low levels. However, most jurisdictions in the United States may be at risk of resurgence or new mpox outbreaks without continued efforts to vaccinate people at risk, based on new modeling analyses.
 - The chance of an outbreak and its predicted size will likely increase over time without continued efforts to vaccinate people at highest risk of mpox exposure.
 - Vaccination, while not 100% protective, remains an important tool in preventing and mitigating infections.

• Call the PDPH Center at 215-685-5488 for any possible or known exposure to Monkeypox

- The call center will ask questions to determine risk of exposure and eligibility to be vaccinated.
- The call center can make appointments for eligible residents to get a Monkeypox vaccine and provide guidance on quarantine, isolation, and safety following exposure.
