
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2018 Philadelphia West Nile Virus Activity Report April 17, 2019

In 2018, 17 human West Nile virus (WNV) cases (14 neuroinvasive, two fever, and one asymptomatic viremic donor) occurred in Philadelphia. Eleven neuroinvasive cases were residents >50 years of age, and the remaining three were an immunocompromised 49 year-old, and two otherwise healthy individuals aged 35 and 22 years old. All symptomatic cases were hospitalized and three neuroinvasive cases were fatal. The first fatal case was a 50-year-old with end-stage renal disease, diabetes, and hypertension. The second fatal case had a history of kidney disease and a brain aneurysm. The last fatality was a 49 year-old who had a history of cancer, stroke, and years prior to their infection with WNV, had been an organ transplant recipient.

From May through October, the Philadelphia Department of Public Health (PDPH) in collaboration with the PA Department of Environmental Protection conducted mosquito management activities throughout Philadelphia, which entailed surveillance and identification of mosquito pools, testing pools for WNV, and implementing control measures (eliminating breeding sites, larviciding catch basins, ground spraying, etc.) at 212 locations across Philadelphia. The cumulative WNV mosquito pool positivity rate was 38% in 2018, the highest recorded since surveillance began in 2001. The next highest positivity rate was 24% in 2012, and the median historic rate from past seasons (2001-2017) is 3.1%.

WNV Testing and Reporting Requirements for Human Surveillance in Philadelphia:

- Collect CSF (from symptom onset–day 8) and serum (day 8–14) from patients with unexplained encephalitis or meningitis for WNV IgM testing.
- Report suspected and confirmed WNV infections (neuroinvasive or non-neuroinvasive illness) and encephalitis cases to PDPH by telephone at 215-685-6742 (or 215-686-4514 after hours). Reports also may be faxed to 215-238-6947.
