LATEST NEWS ON THE NORTHEAST PLANE CRASH

- The City established a hotline for ongoing case management and support for residents and businesses recovering from aircraft crash in Northeast Philadelphia on January 31, 2025.
 - Anyone needing resources or follow-up can call 215-586-3400.
 - The <u>online blog</u>, which includes a <u>Resource Assistance Directory</u>, will continue to be updated.
- The Red Cross case deadline is <u>Wednesday, February 26, 2025</u>.
 - Support services are still available through the American Red Cross.
 - Call 1-800-RED-CROSS (1-800-733-2767) by Wednesday, February 26, 2025 to open a case and see if you are eligible for financial assistance in addition to other services.
- The Small Business Support application deadline is <u>Friday</u>, <u>February 28, 2025</u>.
 - Small businesses can apply for up to \$20,000 in grant support through <u>the Merchants Fund Emergency Relief Grants</u> to help alleviate economic hardship caused by the plane crash disaster.
 - The application deadline to apply is **February 28, 2025**.
- The Mayor's Business Action Team continues to provide personalized assistance by holding in-person office hours.
 - Staff can assist with questions, operational challenges, financial support program applications, and share resources.
 - Upcoming date: **Friday, February 28** from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at the Northeast Regional Library 2228 Cottman Avenue, 19149.

BIRD FLU (H5N1) UPDATE

- The current bird flu outbreak also called avian influenza, H5N1, or HPAI started in February 2022.
 - 70 people have contracted bird flu in the U.S., none reported in Pennsylvania.
 - 37 commercial poultry flocks, 44 backyard flocks, and many wild birds have individually tested positive in Pennsylvania.
 - Some of those wild birds were found in Philadelphia and the health department has responded.

• Risk for Philadelphians

- If you don't work closely with chickens, other poultry, dairy cows, or wild birds, your risk of getting bird flu is low.
- Still, it's best to avoid direct contact with these animals to stay safe.

• This virus could spread from animals to people:

- if you touch something with the virus and touch your eyes, nose, or mouth
- if you eat, drink, or inhale droplets in the air contaminated with the live virus
- if you touch sick or dead animals infected with virus
- if a liquid containing live virus splashes into your eyes, nose, or mouth (for example, raw cow's milk from an infected cow)
- Contact a healthcare provider if you have been around birds or animals and are sick with any of the following symptoms:
 - Eye redness, fever, cough, sore throat, trouble breathing, runny/stuffy nose, body aches or diarrhea
 - Be sure to tell them you have been around live birds.
- To protect yourself, wash your hands often and get vaccinated for seasonal flu.
