MEASLES CASE IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY

On Sunday, March 2, 2025, Montgomery County Department of Health and Human Services announced that they are currently investigating a confirmed case of measles in an unvaccinated child.

People who were on **China Airlines Airport Shuttle Bus** during the following time period may have been exposed to measles:

- Between 9:30pm on Tuesday, February 25 and 3:15am on Wednesday, February 26
- The bus originally departed from JFK Airport Terminal 4 and made stops at the following locations:
 - **Cherry Hill:** H Mart (1720 Marlton Pike East, Cherry Hill, NJ 08033)
 - **South Philadelphia:** Riverview Plaza, Pho Saigon (1100 S Christopher Columbus Blvd, Philadelphia, PA 19147)
 - North Philadelphia: Pho Ha Saigon (757 Adams Avenue, Philadelphia, PA 19120)
- A full schedule of stops is available at **Airport Shuttle Bus | China Airlines**.
- Important Note: All listed businesses were closed at the time of drop-off and are not locations of exposure.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU HAVE BEEN EXPOSED TO MEASLES

If you were on the China Airlines Airport Shuttle Bus between 9:30pm on February 25, 2025 and 3:15am on February 26, 2025, your local health department should be reaching out to you. Shuttle bus passengers also can call 215-685-6740 if you have questions. People on the shuttle bus on this specific date and time should follow the below instructions to determine if you are protected from measles, and symptoms to look out for if you are not protected.

- **Determine if you are protected against measles.** Generally, you are considered protected (immune) if you:
 - Were born before 1957, or
 - Have already had measles, or
 - Have received **two doses** of measles-containing vaccine (usually given as measles, mumps, rubella (MMR) vaccine), *or*
 - Have a blood test showing immunity to measles.
- If you are protected from measles, you do not have to do anything. Measles vaccine is extremely effective at preventing measles.
- Some adults received only one dose of MMR vaccine as children. Adults who received one dose of MMR vaccine as previously are likely protected, but if they don't have proof of immunity and were exposed, they should get another dose of vaccine.
- People who are moderately to severely immune compromised should let their provider know they were exposed to measles and call PDPH.

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IF YOU ARE NOT PROTECTED FROM MEASLES, YOU SHOULD RECEIVE A DOSE OF MMR VACCINE.

- Contact your healthcare provider or pediatrician right away, especially if you don't feel well. Tell your doctor about your possible measles exposure.
- Alert your healthcare provider before visiting. Tell them that you've been exposed to measles and ask them to call the Health Department at 215-685-6740.
- Stay home. You could give measles to vulnerable people, so you must guarantine.

IF YOU ARE NOT SURE IF YOU ARE IMMUNE:

- If you were exposed to measles and aren't sure if you're immune, you should:
 - Contact your healthcare provider or pediatrician right away, especially if you don't feel well. They can review your immunization records to make sure you've had both doses of MMR vaccine.
 - Wear a mask in indoor public spaces and around anyone who is unvaccinated, until you learn your status. This will help prevent others from being exposed.

ABOUT MEASLES

- Measles is a virus that spreads very easily from person to person.
- Measles spreads easily through coughing and sneezing or when someone touches a contaminated surface and then their face. The virus can stay in the air and on surfaces for up to two hours.
- The early symptoms of measles are fever, runny nose, cough, and puffy eyes, followed by rash. In some people, it can be a very serious infection that leads to pneumonia, brain infection, and death.

recommended at 12-15 months and again when a child turns 4. Infants over 6 months old should get a dose of MMR vaccine before traveling to a country where measles is more




Top 4 Things Parents Need to Know about Measles

Measles is very contagious and can be serious. An unvaccinated child can get measles when traveling abroad or even in the U.S. Two doses of MMR vaccine provide the best protection against measles for your child.

You may be wondering what you as a parent really need to know about measles. CDC has put together a list of the most important facts about measles for parents like you.

1. Measles can be serious.



- About 1 in 5 people in the U.S. who get measles will be hospitalized 1 out of every 1,000 people with measles will develop brain swelling, which could lead to brain damage
- 1 to 3 out of 1,000 people with measles will die, even with the best care

Some of the more common measles symptoms include:

- high fever (may spike to more than 104° F),
- cough,
- runny nose (coryza), red, watery eyes (conjunctivitis), and
- rash (3-5 days after symptoms begin).
